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one of the most famous literary critics of the twentieth century edward said s work has been hugely influential far beyond academia as a prominent advocate for the palestinian cause and a noted music critic said redefined the role of the public intellectual in his books as scholarly as they are readable he challenged conventional critical demarcations between disciplines his major opus orientalism is a key text in postcolonial studies that continues to influence as well as challenge scholars in the field conor mccarthy introduces the reader to said s major works and examines how his work and life were intertwined he explains recurring themes in said s writings on literature and empire on intellectuals and literary theory on music and on the israel palestine conflict this concise informative and clearly written introduction for students beginning to study said is ideally set up to explain the complexities of his work to new audiences

orientalism and literature discusses a key critical concept in literary studies and how it assists our reading of literature it reviews the

concept's evolution how it has been explored, imagined and narrated in literature. Part i considers orientalism's origins and its geographical and multidisciplinary scope, then considers the major genres and trends orientalism inspired in the literary critical field, such as the eighteenth century oriental tale, reading the bible and Victorian oriental fiction. Part ii recaptures specific aspects of Edward Said's orientalism: the multidisciplinary contexts and scholarly discussions it has inspired, such as colonial discourse, race, resistance, feminism and travel writing. Part iii deliberates upon recent and possible future applications of orientalism, probing its currency and effectiveness in the twenty-first century, the role it has played and continues to play in the operation of power and how in new forms, neo-orientalism and islamophobia, it feeds into various genres, from migrant writing to journalism.

With their powerful blend of political and aesthetic concerns, Edward W. Said's writings have transformed the field of literary studies. This long-awaited collection of literary and cultural essays offers evidence of how much the fully engaged critical mind can contribute to the reservoir of value, thought and action essential to our lives and culture.

Addressing a neglected dimension in postcolonial scholarship, Oliver Lovesey examines the figure of the postcolonial intellectual as repeatedly evoked by the fabled troika of Said, Spivak and Bhabha, and by members of the Pan-African diaspora such as Cabral, Fanon and James Lovejoy. Lovejoy's primary focus is Ngũgĩ wa Thiong'o, one of the greatest writers of post-independence Africa. Ngũgĩ continues to be a vibrant cultural agitator and innovator who, in contrast to many other public intellectuals, has participated directly in grassroots cultural renewal, enduring imprisonment and exile as a consequence of his engagement in political action. Lovejoy's comprehensive study concentrates on Ngũgĩ's non-fictional prose writings, including his largely overlooked early journalism and his most recent autobiographical and theoretical work. He offers a postcolonial critique that acknowledges Ngũgĩ's complex position as a virtual spokesperson for the oppressed and global conscience who now speaks from a location of privilege. Ngũgĩ's writings, Lovejoy shows, display a seemingly paradoxical consistency in their concerns over nearly five decades, at the same time that there have been enormous transformations in his ideology and a shift in his focus from Africa's holocaust to Africa's renaissance. Lovejoy argues that Ngũgĩ's view

of the intellectual has shifted from an alienated nearly neocolonial stance to a position that allows him to celebrate intellectual activism and a return to the model of the oral vernacular intellectual even as he challenges other global intellectuals tracing the development of this notion of the postcolonial intellectual lovesey argues for ng□g□ s rightful position as a major postcolonial theorist who helped establish postcolonial studies

by positioning the late edward said s political interventions as a public intellectual on behalf of palestinian populations living under israeli occupation as a form of intellectual resistance abraham moves to consider forms of physical resistance seeking to better understand the motivations of those who choose to turn their bodies into weapons

combining literary cultural and political history and based on extensive archival research archives of authority argues that cultural politics specifically america s often covert patronage of the arts played a highly important role in the transfer of imperial authority from britain to the usa during a critical period after wwii

said demonstrates that critical discourse has been strengthened by the writings of derrida and foucault and by influences like marxism structuralism linguistics and psychoanalysis but he argues these forces have compelled literature to meet the requirements of a theory or system ignoring complex affiliations binding the texts to the world

from sartre to levinas continental philosophers have looked to the example of the jew as the paradigmatic object of and model for ethical inquiry levinas for example powerfully dedicates his 1974 book otherwise than being to the victims of the holocaust and turns attention to the state of philosophy after auschwitz such an ethics radically challenges prior notions of autonomy and comprehension two key ideas for traditional ethical theory and more generally the greek tradition it seeks to respect the opacity of the other and avoid the dangers of hermeneutic violence but how does such an ethics of the other translate into real everyday life what is at stake in thinking the other as jew is the alterity of the jew simply a counter to greek universalism is a rhetoric of exceptionalism with its unavoidable ontological residue at odds with shifting political realities within this paradigm what then becomes of the arab or muslim the other of the jew the other of the other so to speak this line of ethical thought in its desire to bear witness to past suffering and come to terms with subjectivity after auschwitz arguably brackets from analysis present operations of power would then a more sensitive historical approach expose the palestinian as the other of the israeli here zahi zalloua offers a challenging intervention into how we configure the contemporary

Revolving around the theme of counterpoint, extensively used by Edward Said as the interplay of diverse ideas and discrepant experiences, this book aims to explore Said's contribution to the fields of comparative literature, literary criticism, postcolonial theory, exilic and transnational studies, and socio-political thought, among many others. Overshadowed by his legitimate political positions in support of the Palestinian cause and at odds with islamophobic hostilities, Said's intellectual achievements in the fields of humanities and philosophical thinking should equally be acknowledged and celebrated. Said articulates his notion of counterpoints through a vivid description of the composition of Western classical music. In the counterpoint of Western classical music, various themes play off one another, with only a provisional privilege being given to any particular one. Yet in the resulting polyphony, there is concert and order, an organized interplay that derives from the themes, not from a rigorous melodic or formal principle. Outside the work, this book pays tribute to Said's contrapuntal methodology as well as to his academic and humanistic legacy.
