the historical background of seventh day adventism psychological factors the heart of adventist theology ellen g white and the spirit of prophecy the sleep of the soul and the destruction of the wicked the sabbath the lord's day and the mark of the beast the sanctuary the investigative judgment and the scapegoat law grace and salvation the remnant church the problem of fellowship a great controversy

in debates about the authority of the bible people commonly argue that the bible is inspired even inerrant and therefore that it has authority is this argument valid dr edward w h vick argues that it is not that authority does not derive from inspiration and that terms like inspiration and inerrancy do not contribute to a belief in or the authority of the scriptures at all using the example of the seventh day adventist church and debates over the inspiration and authority of the bible and then of ellen g white he outlines and illustrates the pitfalls of arguing directly from an idea of inspiration to a view of authority in short he maintains that a doctrine of inspiration cannot serve to establish the authority of a writing writings have authority as they are accepted by and used in the community as a philosopher with years of teaching experience in biblical studies and theology dr vick examines the way in which christians speak about these issues and then asks whether what we say is contributing to what we do or where we wish to go seventh day adventists especially owe it to themselves to read this compact yet powerful book as they think about their use of e g white's writings and their relationship with scripture other christians can benefit however as the arguments are similar whether one is talking about the bible itself an authoritative figure in your religious tradition or a source of interpretation and application you view as authoritative it is especially relevant in a pluralistic world how is it that you decide what is authoritative

seventh day adventism was born as a radical millenarian sect in nineteenth century america it has since spread across the world achieving far more success in latin america africa and asia than in its native land in what seems a paradox

adventist expectation of christ s imminent return has led the denomination to develop extensive educational publishing and health systems increasingly established within a variety of societies adventism over time has modified its views on many issues and accommodated itself to the delay of the second advent in the process it has become a multicultural religion that nonetheless reflects the dominant influence of its american origins this second edition of historical dictionary of the seventh day adventists covers its history through a chronology an introductory essay appendixes and an extensive bibliography the dictionary section has over 600 cross referenced entries on key people cinema politics and government sports and critics of ellen white this book is an excellent access point for students researchers and anyone wanting to know more about seventh day adventism

the completely revised second edition further explores one of the most successful of america s indigenous religious groups despite this the adventist church has remained largely invisible seeking a sanctuary casts light on this marginal religion through its socio historical context and discusses several adventist figures that shaped the perception of this christian sect

covering the millerite movement of the 1830s and 1840s sabbatarian adventism prior to organization of the denomination and the seventh day adventist church since its organization in 1861 63 this volume provides a comprehensive history of the denomination the first major element of the book is a chronology of adventist history that begins with william miller s conclusion in 1818 that the second advent of jesus would occur about 1843 and extends through the science and theology conferences of 2002 04 the interpretive introduction that follows places the emergence of adventism within the context of the second great awakening describes the development of sabbatarian adventism from its early opposition to church organization to its highly institutionalized and bureaucratically structured contemporary form and examines the denomination s geographical expansion from a small north american sect to a global church the dictionary entries that constitute the bulk of the volume address individuals organizations institutions and doctrines that have been important in the history of the church including dissident movements and individuals who have emerged as critics of the denomination and its beliefs second there are entries on the development and current situation of adventism in many individual countries finally thematic entries on such subjects as art music literature health care and women address other elements important to understanding church life the dictionary entries are followed by a bibliography of scholarly and popular works published by the denomination commercial and academic presses and individuals and organizations

dynamic truth is a reprint of the author s groundbreaking dissertation on change in seventh day adventist theology submitted in 1995 and initially published in 1999 part i and 2000 part ii it is the first and only in depth study to date dealing with the issue of doctrinal development from an adventist perspective part i analyzes the intricate problem of doctrinal development and presents a historical survey of theories of doctrinal change classifying them in three ideal types in the author s view a dialectic approach concerned about substantial continuity as well as authentic change can best avoid the pitfalls of dogmatic immobilism and revisionism part ii provides a detailed study of the problem of doctrinal change in a seventh day adventist setting it analyzes the extent nature and direction of doctrinal developments in the light of the religious background of the church and the social forces at work in it it also discusses the church s response to doctrinal adjustments and ellen g white s involvement in and conception of doctrinal change the study concludes that adventist teachings have been significantly affected by theological and hermeneutical developments under the impact of social forces nudging the church closer towards evangelical protestantism ellen white co founder of the church was personally involved in theological change her concept of doctrinal development shows a remarkable depth of insight and presents a well balanced approach to the dynamics of faith and truth

from its humble beginnings in the nineteenth century seventh day adventism has remarkably grown to become one of america s largest home grown faiths numbering nearly nineteen million members worldwide yet adventism harbors

dark secrets within its history this is the true story of how one adventist pastor and university and seminary professor discovered these dark secrets and learned through painful personal experience that neither the denomination nor its doctrine could be trusted as his odyssey takes him from pastoral assignments in rural and urban congregations and finally into teaching religion at an adventist university he suddenly finds himself caught up in the maelstrom of a church's greatest theological crisis for him the denomination's theology and practice agonizingly unravel forcing him to choose between loyalty to his church his vocation and his personal integrity rich in anecdotes and personal experiences out of adventism guides readers interested in religious history cults and sects through the ins and outs of a religious community in crisis along the way the reader not only gets an insider's view of adventism but also discovers a careful critique of the peculiar teachings of seventh day adventism

this book explores how seventh day adventists like other christians can benefit from generating their own version of *communio ecclesiology* it starts by offering a critical analysis of the status quo of the existing adventist portrayal of church as remnant and suggests potential ways of moving this tradition forward to articulate a more rounded and comprehensive vision of the church's rich and multifaceted relational nature this book draws on the mainstream christian *koinonia* based framework consequently it provides possible solutions to some of the most divisive ecclesial issues that christian communities face today regarding church structure ministry mission communal interpretation and reform as it sets on a new footing the conversation between adventism and other mainstream christian traditions the methodology of this book serves as a pathway for any christian community to use when revisiting and enhancing its own current theologies of the church

this study presents the first comprehensive analysis of seventhday adventist interchurch relations a 20 million member body whose ecumenical stance has so far been underresearched for the sake of interpreting denominational involvement and reservations in adventism as well as beyond the study develops a new academic approach to ecumenism based on relational models theory a comprehensive social science paradigm of interpreting human relationships the resulting typology of ecumenical interactions and the historical case study of adventism suggest that such a relational interpretation of ecumenical interaction sheds light on many of the unresolved issues in ecumenics such as divergent concepts of unity difficulties in recognition processes and the permanence of denominationalism

the seventh day adventist church which recently passed the 12 million member mark is a movement that owes much of its identity to a unique missiology this short study is an effort to contribute to the most important aspects and issues of this missiology as reflected in seventh day adventist history and in the present situation of the denomination the author considers the historical patterns of the expansion of the church and the theological background
